These books are great for hearing your child read aloud, discussing at home, exploring new vocabulary and predicting what might happen next.




Halo Moon by Sharon Cohen

The Goldfish Boy by Lisa Thompson






Other Words for Home by Jasmine Warga




D-Day by Tom Palmer


Jelly by Jo Cotterill
