Our mission at St. Joseph's is to offer the community an encounter with the living God - Jesus Christ:



St. Joseph's, through our mission, we understand that prayer and worship is central to all we do within our school community.

This prayer and liturgy policy has been approved and adopted by the governing body in November 2025 and will be reviewed in November 2026.

1. The context of this prayer and liturgy policy

'The celebration of Catholic liturgies and prayers as an integral part of the learning and teaching should enable the school community to become reflective, experience the presence of God and should develop a mature spiritual life.' (Marcus Stock (2012), *Christ at the Centre*, Catholic Truth Society, 23.)

2. Statement of requirement

The law requires all maintained Catholic schools to provide an act of daily collective worship (prayer and liturgy) for all pupils, including those in the sixth form (Section 70, 1988 Education Act) that is in accordance with the rites, practices, disciplines, and liturgical norms of the Catholic Church (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, schedule 20; Instrument of Government, clause 2). Academies in England are required by their funding agreement and Articles of Association to comply with similar requirements (*The Mainstream Academy and Free School: Supplemental Funding Agreement*, December 2020; *Model Articles for Catholic Academies*, February 2019).

The law requires all maintained schools to recognise and respect that parents have the legal right to withdraw their children up to the age of 16 from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1A)).

Sixth-form pupils can choose to withdraw themselves from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1B)). The school's provision for prayer and liturgy will fulfil pupils' entitlement to experience the range of liturgical treasures of the Church, including a shared repertoire of prayers and liturgical music with which pupils in the school will be familiar.

Prayer and liturgy are not designated curriculum time. In the context of the Catholic school, this means that times of prayer and liturgy are not considered to be part of the allocation of curriculum time for Religious Education.

3. Responsibility

(a) Governance

The governors, as guardians of the Catholic school's life and mission, have a responsibility to ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- there is a named person(s) who is responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school (the Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator)
- the prayer and liturgy policy is updated regularly and shared with all stakeholders
- there is a budget for prayer and liturgy that reflects its centrality to the life of a Catholic school.

(b) Headteacher

The Headteacher, as the spiritual leader of the school as a Catholic community,



ensures that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- they work in partnership with the leader(s) for prayer and liturgy
- those responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school have been given appropriate training and formation to ensure that all guidance is followed and adhered to
- there are suitable resources for prayer and liturgy in the school.

(c) Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator


Those responsible for prayer and liturgy ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line
 with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- there is an Annual Plan of Provision for prayer and liturgy across the school year which identifies liturgical seasons and key celebrations, as well as opportunities for the celebration of the Sacraments
- there is daily planned prayer for all pupils, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy are appropriate and readily available to staff and pupils
- induction on prayer and liturgy takes place for new members of staff as required
- staff have access to effective training and formation opportunities
- monitoring and evaluation of prayer and liturgy take place regularly and feed back into planning for future liturgies
- monitoring of prayer and liturgy is reported to the Headteacher and governing body to support whole-school development and the Catholic life of the school
- there is collaboration with local clergy and parishes
- liaison with the Diocesan Education Service and others is maintained to ensure they keep updated with best practice.

4. Overview of prayer and liturgy provision

At St. Joseph's, prayer holds deep significance as a way of nurturing a personal relationship with Jesus. The phrase "Lifting hearts and minds to God" emphasizes the importance of dedicating time to communicate with Jesus, both by speaking to Him and listening to His voice in our lives. Prayer is not just a ritual, but a meaningful interaction where young people are invited to reflect, grow spiritually, and deepen their love for Jesus. This relationship is further strengthened through liturgical celebrations throughout the school year.

As students mature through their journey at St. Joseph's, we hope and work hard that their prayer life evolves. Moving from simple expressions of faith to a deeper understanding and intimacy with God, their journey is marked by the continuous development of their spiritual relationship. Prayer becomes an integral part of their lives, allowing them to hear God's guidance and carry His wisdom into their everyday actions. Ultimately, prayer is not only an expression of love for Jesus, but a way of actively inviting His presence into our hearts, shaping our lives with His grace and wisdom.



Prayer is woven throughout our daily timetable to ensure that our school community remains connected to God at all times.

- Start of Day: The school day begins with a collective prayer and a reflection on the Mission.
- Lunchtime: Grace is said before meals to remind us of the blessings we receive.
- End of Day: The day concludes with the Our Father, and during the months of October and May, the Hail Mary is also recited.

Weekly Timetable of Worship

Monday	Gospel Celebration of the Word Led by the Headteacher or member of the SLT, following the key theme and relevant reading of the forthcoming Sunday. Focus to invite all members of the community to engage in the Gospel message and how as disciples of Christ we have a mission to live out these values and virtues. Resources are shared with parents (via the Headteacher's Blog) to encourage parents to celebrate the Gospel at home with their children.
Tuesday	Prayer focus A dedicated time each week to invite children to enter into a wide variety of prayers which we hope to open their hearts and minds and build their own relationship with Christ. Prayers link to the liturgical season, Gospel teaching or value and virtue of the week.
Wednesday	Celebrate Led by the class teacher. The plan for this time will be taken from the Day the Day Planning slides which will be revisited and are carefully linked to the weekly RE lesson.
Thursday	Child-led Worship (Class/Year group) Weekly class/year group worship is led by the class teachers and the children. This again focuses on the key theme and Gospel of the week, through the format of Gather, Listen, Response and Mission. This is time for the children to respond themselves to what they have learnt over the week and develop their own understanding, differentiated to suit the children. Focus on more child-led worship to create a reflective atmosphere and children leading their understanding of their faith.
Friday	Class Celebration of the Word Each class throughout the year will create their own celebration of the Word, based on the weekly Gospel theme and share their reflections and understanding with the school and parents. This is shown through the creative medium of drama, song, choral readings and prayer.

Liturgical Celebrations

At St. Joseph's, liturgy and worship provide opportunities for all members of the community—children, adults, parents, and parishioners—to come together in faith. These celebrations reflect the Church's liturgical calendar, ensuring that daily scripture readings correspond to the relevant liturgical season.

• Advent and Lent: These seasons of preparation for Christmas and Easter are given special attention. Activities such as fundraising for charitable causes, prayer groups, and reflective

sessions are organized for the children, with volunteer staff leading these initiatives. Assemblies and prayers at these times reflect the themes of these seasons. Newsletters are sent home to inform parents about the importance of the seasons and encourage participation.

- **Christmas:** Infant and Junior nativities and carol concerts celebrate the birth of Christ, allowing children to share the story of the nativity with the school and the wider community.
- Holy Week: In the final week of the Spring Term, preparations for Easter include focusing on the key events of Holy Week, with class prayers and reflections on Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday. The week culminates with the 'Way of the Cross,' where parents and parishioners are invited to witness the 'Passion Play,' with each class meditating on different aspects of Holy Week.
- **New Life Liturgy:** Following Easter, a New Life Liturgy celebrates the resurrection. This special assembly, organized by the Reception class, highlights the importance of new life in Christ and marks the joy of the Easter season.

Holy Days of Obligation

Holy Days of Obligation are marked with a Mass or Liturgy led by different year groups. These are held either in the parish church of St. Mary's or within the school hall, ensuring that the entire community comes together to celebrate the faith.

Patronal Feast Day

St. Joseph's Feast Day is a special occasion marked with a Mass where each class is represented, followed by various activities and celebrations throughout the day. This is a joyful event where the whole school comes together in honour of our Patron Saint.

Year Group Masses and Adoration


Throughout the year, year groups are invited to join Adoration and then the Parish Mass.

Reconciliation

Reconciliation services are offered to Year 6 (Advent) and Year 5 (Lent), led by parish priests. These services provide an opportunity for individual confession. For children who have not yet received their First Holy Communion, a time for reflection and prayer is provided, encouraging spiritual growth and the development of a closer relationship with God.

Reflection Day

In the final term, Year 6 students participate in a day retreat. This day is a time for reflection and spiritual preparation, particularly as it relates to their upcoming Leavers' Mass. The day involves activities such as drama, prayer writing, crafts, and music, all aimed at helping the children reflect on their time at St. Joseph's and prepare for the next stage of their spiritual journey.



In addition to the scheduled prayer times, children are offered a variety of prayer opportunities throughout the day:

- **Lunchtime Prayer**: Our Parish Chaplain runs prayer groups on Tuesday lunchtime to support children in their prayer journey.
- **Chaplain Support**: A lunchtime chaplain is available to offer guidance and support, particularly in the areas of relationships and behaviour.
- Seasonal and Special Prayers: During important times of the year, such as November for Remembrance or during Marian months (October and May), additional prayer opportunities are provided. Special prayers such as the Rosary, Bible stories, and praise and worship are incorporated into the school's routine.

These initiatives ensure that prayer remains a central and meaningful part of life at St. Joseph's, fostering a community that is rooted in faith, love, and service to one another.

5. Our school context

The implementation of Liturgical norms and practice in the school draws also from the principles from the Directory of Masses with children.

a. Scripture

Scripture readings will be taken from the lectionary (ESVCE). The Revised New Jerusalem Bible or Catholic Good News Bible. Liturgical readings will normally be proclaimed from the lectionary or well-bound bible. However, printed copies, appropriately presented, may be used as a reasonable adjustment for children or adults who need to annotate the text or present it in another format.

b. Core Structure for Liturgies of the Word

These will follow the established pattern of Gather, Listen, Response, Mission.

c. Posture and gesture

The postures and gestures proper to the assembly in the liturgical books will be used, in particular, making the sign of the cross, standing for the Gospel and standing or kneeling for the Eucharistic Prayer.

d. Music.

Whole school liturgies will include a gathering hymn. The Ordinary of the Mass will be sung (Gloria, Holy Holy, Amen, Lamb of God). The school community works with the School Singing Programme to develop its repertoire. Music is chosen following the principles outlined in Sing to the Lord, in particular paying attention to a judgement which is liturgical, pastoral and musical.

e. Ministries

Liturgical ministries are exercised by those reborn by water and the Holy Spirit and who are in sacramental communion with the Catholic Church. Such ministries include reading of scripture, bidding prayers, presentation of the gifts and serving. As these flow from the dignity of baptism they are open to children who have not yet been admitted to the Eucharist, according to their age and maturity. All may participate in the communal actions of the liturgy, according to their conscience



and the wishes of their families. Other opportunities to serve the school community will be afforded to those who are not able to undertake liturgical ministries.

6. Resourcing

Prayer and liturgy are central to the school's understanding of itself as a Catholic school, and this is reflected in the annual budget allocation and available resources, including staff time, chaplaincy provision, and dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy. The Catholic character of the school is reflected in religious artefacts and images on display throughout the building. Dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy will be furnished and maintained as such, and updated to reflect the Church's liturgical season. Staff training and formation costs will be funded separately to ensure that all staff are able to fulfil their responsibility to contribute to the prayer and liturgical life of the school.

7. Training and formation

All new staff will be supported during induction and beyond, so that they fully understand the responsibility they carry within their individual role for leading prayer and liturgy in the school. Any individual training needs will be identified and addressed through training and formation. There will also be the opportunity for whole-staff professional development at least once a year, so that all staff understand the importance of prayer and liturgy and relevant staff are well supported to lead as required.

8. Monitoring and evaluation

Monitoring and evaluation of the quality and impact of prayer and liturgy will take place regularly, and at least annually, and involve all key stakeholders: pupils, parents, staff, clergy, and governors. Areas for development will be identified and issues raised will be actioned and evidenced as appropriate.

9. Review

The policy will be reviewed as part of the regular cycle of policy review conducted by the governors.
